

Chilean Flamingos

Turn right to follow the footpath between the geladas (on your right) and the flamingos (on your left).

Look down into the valley.
How many flamingos can you see?

Did you know?

A group of flamingos is called a flamboyance.

What **colour** are their feathers?

Pink

They get this colour from the **shrimp and algae** (tiny plant-like organisms) that they eat. If they didn't have this diet, flamingos would be grey.

Capybara

If you are lucky, you may be able to spot a capybara in the valley too.
Have a look and see if you can find her.

Capybaras are **adapted** to their grassy marshland habitat.
They have webbed feet for swimming (like ducks) and brown fur to help them hide from **predators**.

If you were a capybara, where would **you** choose to hide from a predator?

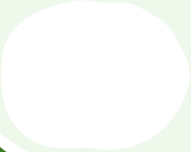
